# Behind the Shelves: The Team That Keeps the Library Running Smoothly

## *Spotlight on Worcester Public Library's Tech Services Department*

**When you walk into the Worcester Public Library and find exactly the book, audiobook, or movie you were looking for—or something you didn't even know you wanted—you can thank the Tech Services Department.**

This team of seven detail-loving staff works mostly behind the scenes, but their efforts are felt in every corner of the library. From the moment a new item is ordered to the moment it hits the shelves, Tech Services makes sure the right materials are available, findable, and ready to be enjoyed. In FY 2025, they cataloged 29,049 items—more than 27,000 books, nearly 1,000 DVDs and Blu-rays, and over 450 audiobooks. That includes 13,000 items for adults and 16,000 for children and teens, building a collection that truly serves the whole community.



Cataloging involves far more than just adding a title to the system. The team carefully reviews and labels every item, ensuring it's categorized and easy to find. It's a mix of librarian-level precision and everyday user-friendliness that makes discovering your next favorite story seamless.

And it's not just books anymore. Tech Services also manages the **Library of Things**, a collection of non-traditional items you can borrow just like a book. Want to try a synthesizer, project your own movie, or borrow a telescope? How about a croquet set, knitting needles, or even a power washer? Thanks to Tech Services, it's all possible—and easy to find in the catalog, whether you're looking for tarot cards or tug-of-war ropes.

"Our team definitely leans nerdy," one staff member jokes. "We love getting the details right—but we also know the most important thing is making it easy for people to find what they need."

**From timeless classics to trekking poles, Tech Services is the quiet force behind the library magic that keeps Worcester discovering, creating, and learning.**



# Reimagining Library Spaces to Meet Community Needs

**Over the past year, the Worcester Public Library has continued to evolve, transforming spaces to better reflect how our community engages with them.** Informed by user feedback and observation, we made thoughtful changes to our layout and furnishings, introduced new programs and services, and reimagined key areas throughout the library.

To better serve our patrons, several new spaces were created and enhanced. Five study pods were added on the third floor to help meet the high demand for study rooms, providing quiet areas for tutoring, virtual appointments, studying, and small group discussions. A dedicated social worker office was also established, featuring glass walls to balance transparency with privacy, which offers a safe and welcoming space for one-on-one consultations with our Social Services Specialist. In addition, the First Floor Ellipse was enclosed with glass and transformed into a versatile meeting space, further expanding opportunities for collaboration, programming, and engagement.

**These updates were designed to enhance functionality, comfort, and accessibility, ensuring our spaces remain vibrant, welcoming, and responsive to the diverse needs of our patrons.**

From flexible seating to program-friendly layouts, every change was made with the goal of maximizing our impact and enriching the library experience for all.



# You Belong Here! Celebration



After more than a year of thoughtful planning, community engagement, and collaborative designing, the vibrant You Belong Here! public art and lighting installation was unveiled on the Salem Street façade of the Main Library.

This inspiring project was made possible through a partnership between the WPL, the WPLF and the Downtown Worcester Business Improvement District. It was brought to life through the dedicated efforts of project facilitator Creative Hub Worcester and local artist Sharinna Travieso.

**Designed to reflect the powerful theme of belonging, the installation celebrates the rich diversity of Worcester's voices and cultures, offering a welcoming message to all who visit the library and the downtown area.**





# Celebrating Women's History Month

In April, the Worcester Public Library proudly hosted a special exhibit in honor of Women's History Month at the Main Library. Presented in partnership with the WooSox Foundation and the United Way of Central Massachusetts, *Chasing A Dream – The Story of Girls and Women in Baseball* celebrated the rich, and often overlooked, contributions of women to the sport of baseball.

Spanning more than 150 years of history, the exhibit featured stories, photographs, and artifacts dating from 1859 to 2015. **It offered visitors a compelling look at the perseverance, talent, and impact of girls and women who have helped shape the game, from early pioneers to modern-day trailblazers.** This engaging exhibit not only educated and inspired but also underscored the importance of inclusion and representation in America's pastime.



# SummerQuest 2025: Level Up at Your Library!

SummerQuest 2025 invited children, teens, and adults to “level up” at WPL through reading, hands-on activities, and game-like challenges. **This theme focused on play, one of the ways we learn to relate to others, to think in new ways, and to foster friendships, new and old.** Once again, WPL partnered with the community to prevent the summer slide by keeping literacy engaging, interactive, and fun.

This year, participants were invited to complete game boards to win cool prizes. Adults loved the “Woonopoly” challenges, and one of the summer’s most popular attractions for kids was the life-size Candy Land board game adventure in the Pappas Children’s Center. Families loved this sweet twist on a classic favorite!

Other featured programs included an Ice Cream Social where kids could beat the heat with an ice cream treat, Switch it Up where patrons could drop in and play video games with friends on the Nintendo Switch, and Beaded Buddies for children to make their own keychain, along with other creative crafts and DIY activities.

**Level Up at Your Library reminded us that libraries are not just a space for knowledge; they are a space for fun!** Though summer always goes by quickly, this year’s program was brimming with exciting and meaningful experiences that brought families and friends together.

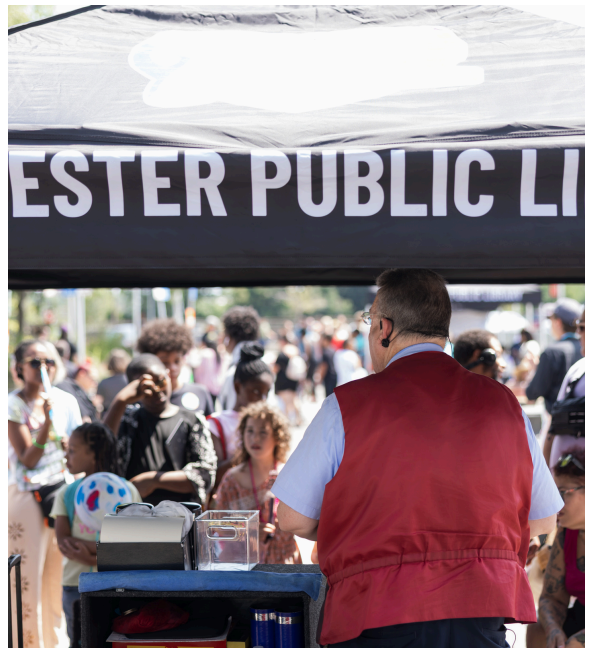
